Preface

The Christian Gospel offers "life in all its fullness" to all of God's children (John 10:10). We see and hear this good news repeatedly in the life and teaching Jesus, as Jesus reaches out to include the "little ones" who have been marginalised and rejected by society.

As we look around the world we see many individuals and groups who do not know "life in all its fullness". People facing war, hunger and disease have little chance of sharing in abundant life. We think of the Ukraine. Gaza. Israel. Throughout the centuries Christian people have always made efforts to support individuals, families, and communities, and overcome those things which harm, exclude, and take away God's gift of life.

Commenced in 1999, the annual Transgender Day of Remembrance was set aside to recognize those who have been killed due to ignorance and hatred, targeted because they were trans or gender non-confirming.

At the Pitt Street Uniting Church it has been our privilege to journey with a number of transgender and other gender diverse people over the years. In doing that we have learnt about our own human journeys.

This booklet includes a liturgy developed in 2021 other worship resources, some of which have been used at Pitt Street. It is offered to the wider Uniting Church as an invitation to think, pray, hope, and work for a world in which violence against transgender people is no more. TDoR comes at the end of Transgender Awareness Week which is a one-week celebration leading up to the Transgender Day of Remembrance.

We are praying for a world, and a church, where all may know the fullness of life God-in-Christ offers.

What is Transgender Day of Remembrance?

Transgender Day of Remembrance (TDOR) was started in 1999 by transgender advocate Gwendolyn Ann Smith as a vigil to honour the memory of Rita Hester, a transgender woman who was killed in 1998.

The vigil commemorated all the transgender people lost to violence since Rita Hester's death, and began an important tradition that has become the annual Transgender Day of Remembrance.

"Transgender Day of Remembrance seeks to highlight the losses we face due to anti-transgender bigotry and violence. I am no stranger to the need to fight for our rights, and the right to simply exist is first and foremost. With so many seeking to erase transgender people -- sometimes in the most brutal ways possible -- it is vitally important that those we lose are remembered, and that we continue to fight for justice."


You can participate in Transgender Day of Remembrance by attending and/or organizing a vigil on November 20 which are held in various cities to honour all those transgender people whose lives were lost to anti-transgender violence that year and learning about the violence affecting the transgender community.

Vigils are typically hosted by local transgender advocates or LGBTQ organizations, and held at community centers, parks, places of worship, and other venues. The vigil often involves reading a list of the names of those lost that year.

Psalm 139.7-18

Reading from Isaiah 53

They were despised and rejected by others, a person of sorrows, and familiar with suffering.

Like one from whom others hide their faces they were despised, and we esteemed them not. Surely, they took up our infirmities and carried our sorrows, yet we considered them stricken by God, smitten by them, and afflicted. But they were pierced for our transgressions, they were crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was upon them, and by their wounds we are healed.

Reading from 1 Corinthians 12.14-26

Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. If the foot would say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear would say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there are many members, yet one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and those members of the body that we think less honourable we clothe with greater honour, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honour to the inferior member, that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honoured, all rejoice together with it.

Reading from John 10: 1-10

'Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers.' Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.

So again Jesus said to them, 'Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly.





A prayer of lament and proclamation for Transgender Day of Remembrance

United Church of Christ USA

Reader 1:

How long, O God?

How long will transgender people suffer shame and loss because of who we are? How long must we bear pain in our souls, and have sorrow in our hearts all day long?

How long shall we have enemies who persecute us, ridicule us, and gloat over us? (adapted from Psalm 10)

Reader 2: Consider and answer me, O Lord my God! Give light to my eyes, or I will sleep the sleep of death, And my enemy will say, "I have prevailed." (from Ps 13)

Reader 3:

Why do you stand far off, hiding yourself in times of trouble? In fear the violent attack the vulnerable – Let them be caught in the schemes their hearts have devised. In confusion and disturbance the oppressors say, "There is no God who cares for the meek – No God will find me out." Their mouths are filed with cursing and deceit and oppression They sit in ambush In stealth they murder the innocent. The helpless fall by their might. They think:

"God has forgotten [the drag queens and cross-dressers, transgender men, transgender women, transgender children and youth, gender-queer people and intersex individuals]* – God has hidden God's face."

Rise up, O Lord; O God, lift up your hand Do not forget the oppressed. (from Ps 10) Silence

Reader 4: Matthew 5:1-9

Silence

All Gathered: Why do murderers rage, and fearful people plot in vain? Those in power, and those who long for power, conspire Against the precious anointed of the Lord. In heaven God laughs at their presumption. I will tell of the decree of the Living, Mighty God Who said to me, "You are my child. Today I have begotten you. Ask of me, and I will make the earth itself your inheritance." *(from Ps 2)*

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
Sending forth
