

	Widen our love, good Spirit, to embrace in your strong care all those of every race. Like wind and fire with life among us move, till we are known as Christ's, and Christians prove.	



A CONVERSATION WITH CONNIE TUTTLE



Exploring Gracious Heresy

Sunday 20 October

12.30 (with light lunch) for 1 pm

at Pitt Street Uniting Church, Sydney

Connie Tuttle is a lesbian, feminist, radical Christian, founder of *Circle of Grace* in the USA, and author of the recent book *A Gracious Heresy: The Queer Calling of an Unlikely Prophet.* She invites us to explore the insistent but 'acutely human and terminally messy' call to prophetic living.

Next Sunday 20 October, the reflection will be given by current Commissioner of the NSW Ageing and Disability Commission Robert Fitzgerald, AM.




The purpose of the NSW Ageing and Disability Commission is to promote the rights of older people and adults with disability to live free from abuse in their family, home and community.

Mr Fitzgerald was previously appointed as a Productivity Commissioner, Community and Disability Services Commissioner and Deputy Ombudsman in NSW.

The Australian Government appointed Mr Fitzgerald as a Commissioner on the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse, from 2013 to 2017. Mr Fitzgerald was also appointed to Chair the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Advisory Board for three years from 2012.

Importantly, Mr Fitzgerald was the convenor of the Indigenous Disadvantage Working Group of the Steering Committee for the Review of Government Service Provision for over 9 years.



Fifty years ago, leaders from various faiths joined together and wrote: "In the turmoil of a world increasingly dominated by violence and characterised by bewilderment and confusion created by the apparent impotence of man to alleviate suffering caused by injustice except by more recourse to violence, it seems to us that an unprecedented spiritual initiative is urgently required. We therefore wish to commend the idea of the World Week of Prayer for Peace." In the five decades since, the interfaith Week of Prayer for World Peace has taken place each October. Bringing together people from all faith communities and none, it has given a chance to learn and share. The words they went on to write could have been written today, "The situation is urgent. Violent conflict within nations and the ever-present threat of war between nations or races pose unprecedented dangers. The delicately interwoven structures of modern society and the contraction of the world by speedy communications have made every part of the globe immediately vulnerable to the effects of any outbreak of violent conflict. But these same factors also offer an unprecedented opportunity to create a quickened sense of brotherhood. Therein lies the overwhelming need for a Week of Prayer for World Peace."

In addition, child-related allegations made about a congregation, presbytery or faith community employee or volunteer are required to be notified to the General Secretary of the Uniting Church who is responsible for investigations and fulfilling reporting obligations to the NSW Ombudsman. Allegation can relate to conduct outside a person's work or volunteer role.
